People praying for peace and love were met with death and destruction. At times like these prayers are only a first step. People of all faiths must take up the challenge to change the world to make it a better place for our children and grandchildren. We must never stand silent or fail to act in the face of hatred, bigotry and violence. Indeed, we must examine our own traditions and ensure that they can never be utilized as an excuse for violence.

Today's attack is a wakeup call. Attitudes must change. We must learn not to judge people for differing modes of dress, language or tradition but instead value our common humanity and our shared, though diverse, quests to understand the divine.
