Lesson Outline

- 1. Introduction (5 minutes)
 - **Greet the class** and open with a brief question: *"What is your favorite holiday and why?"*
 - Introduce Simchat Torah: "Today, we're going to learn about Simchat Torah, the day when we celebrate finishing the reading of the Torah!"
- 2. What is Simchat Torah? (10 minutes)
 - Explain the basics of Simchat Torah in simple terms:
 - On Simchat Torah, we finish reading the Torah and immediately start it again. We celebrate because the Torah is special and precious to us.
 - **Key Concept**: The Torah teaches us how to live a good life and be close to Hashem.
 - Show a picture or a small Torah scroll if available.
 - Interactive activity:

"Can anyone tell me a story from the Torah that they like?" Allow a few children to share.

- 3. How We Celebrate Simchat Torah (10 minutes)
 - Explain the customs of Simchat Torah:
 - Dancing with the Torah (Hakafot) around the synagogue.
 - Singing and lots of joy!
 - Everyone, even children, is encouraged to join the celebration.
 - Activity:

"Let's practice a dance! Pretend we are in shul, and let's dance around as if we're

holding a Torah."

Play a lively Jewish song, and let the children dance in a circle.

4. Introduction to Mitzvot (10 minutes)

- What are Mitzvot?:

"Mitzvot are the special things Hashem asks us to do. They help us live a good and happy life."

- **Examples of Mitzvot** that children can relate to:
 - Honoring parents (Kibbud Av v'Em)
 - Being kind to others (Gemilut Chasadim)
 - Giving tzedakah (charity)
 - Celebrating holidays like Shabbat and Yom Tov

- Simple analogy:

"Imagine Mitzvot are like a treasure map that helps us find the best path in life."

5. Interactive Mitzvah Activity (10 minutes)

Mitzvah Scenarios Game:

Present short scenarios and ask the children what Mitzvah they can do:

- "Your friend is sad. What can you do?" (Kindness)
- "You see someone drop a toy. What can you do?" (Helping others)
- *"It's Friday evening, what Mitzvah can we do?"* (Lighting Shabbat candles)

6. Craft Activity (15 minutes)

- Torah Flag Craft:

Provide materials (colored paper, markers, stickers) for children to make their own Torah flags, which they can wave during the Simchat Torah celebration.

- As they create, encourage them to decorate the flags with words like "Torah" or "Mitzvah" and symbols like stars, hearts, or Torah scrolls.

7. Conclusion (5 minutes)

- Wrap up by reviewing the key points:
 "What do we celebrate on Simchat Torah? What are Mitzvot and why are they important?"
- Closing song: End with a fun and simple song about Simchat Torah or Mitzvot, like "Torah Tziva Lanu Moshe."

Optional: Take-Home Activity

- Simchat Torah Coloring Sheet: Send the children home with a Simchat Torah-themed coloring page to reinforce the lesson.
